"Give me success or its eternal pursuit and I'll take the pursuit."


During a recent study visit to a monastery in Bhutan I learned how to "take the pursuit" with new purpose and deep meaning.

JANUARY



Base Camp brought together (and continues to do so) a collaborative learning experience among a dynamic network of allied health professionals to better understand the complex world of periodontology.











An Exploration of Periodontics


In March, a group of our hygienists, Donna Lavoie, Linda Dakin and Cathy by Dr. Amanda Longo where they compared the efficacy of using ultrasonic instruments versus hand instruments plus ultrasonic instruments mouth treated with the full arsenal of for patients with severe, generalized periodontitis in a randomized controlled split mouth study design.




Data collection on a total of 40 patients was completed in March and it was determined Hamm were part of a research study led that there was no difference in periodontal outcomes at the 8-week re-evaluation between the sides of the mouth treated with ultrasonic instruments alone compared to the sides of the ultrasonic and hand instruments.

> These carefully controlled results suggest to us that in the hands of extremely experienced clinicians, ultrasonic instrumentation may be a more efficient method for sanative root planing (SRP) as they did the same job in less time! The full article is expected to be published in early 2020 - stay tuned!







SURGICAL OPERATORY





A wonderful teambuilding event was held at the Watering Can in Vineland where artistic expression was fostered through the design and creation of succulent planters. The team reflected on the opportunity to leave the world a little bit better through careful and respectful interactions with nature.

After two years of research and development, Dr. Amanda Longo and Dr. Fritz published an article on surgical complications in the Journal of Clinical and Experimental Dental Research. This article introduced a scale which can be used to benchmark best practices between clinics to determine which clinical procedures and techniques work best. You may not be aware, but the Periodontal Wellness and Implant Surgery Clinic in Fonthill has five sister clinics which share the same goals of patient care and devotion to the pursuit of excellence. These clinics are located in Chicago, Houston, Montreal, Vancouver and **Copenhagen**. By using the scale in this paper, it is now possible to compare clinical outcomes and complication rates between clinics. For example, one of the procedures common to periodontal offices is a soft tissue graft (gum graft). By keeping track of every clinical outcome in this study, it was revealed that the revision rate for this type of graft is only 0.7%. When comparing the results to one of the sister clinics which had a higher complication rate, it warranted a visit by that surgical team to Fonthill to observe how the procedure was performed to explain the lower complication rate. It was quickly determined that there could be some improvement in the post-operative instructions given and the sister clinic adjusted their protocols to improve the patient outcome.

The Fonthill Dental Surgery Complication Classification Scale

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Abstract

Objectives: A lack of consensus on how to classify post-operative complications in dentistry limits the ability for comparison of outcomes among treatments and their primary providers. Therefore, the Fonthill Dental Surgery Complication Classification Scale has been proposed as a uniform reporting tool to allow for the standardized quality assessment of dental treatment. This instrument classifies negative outcomes arising after dental treatment and is based on the clinician and the clinician time required to resolve the complication in seven classes of increasing severity.

Materials and Methods: The scale was evaluated in a cohort of 2,382 consecutive patients, of which 9% experienced a complication, the majority of which were Class I or Class II—resolved without intervention by the dental surgeon.

Results: Four scenarios where interpretation of the scale was required are presented with an explanation of their complication class.

Conclusions: This classification system will ultimately prove reliable in measuring clinician success rate and aiding in the decision-making process for patients, clinicians, and financial providers.

Donna Lavoie and Amanda Longo were invited to present their primary findings from the Ultrasonics Study at the International Symposium for Dental Hygiene in Brisbane, Australia. There was standing room only for the highly anticipated presentation and it was positively received and appreciated by the international audience.





Roxanne More was invited to give a unique presentation of her work on the Dental Hygiene Residency program, in Brisbane, Australia. The Dental Hygiene residency is a program developed in partnership by Dr. Fritz and Carolyn Triemstra at Niagara College to create future leaders for the Dental Hygiene Profession by immersing them in a specialty clinic after graduation.







Linda Dakin and Professor Wendy Ward were invited to present a lecture on a novel partnership which culminates in a productive research collaboration between a University and private clinic. Since 2002, this partnership has resulted in 8 peer reviewed articles and significant research experiences for 4 M.Sc. students. Presently, there are 2 M.Sc. students and one Ph.D. student conducting research at the clinic in Fonthill.





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The Periodontal Wellness and Implant Surgery Clinic is a proud sponsor of The World Innovation Network (TWIN). TWIN is a community of innovation and growth leaders from across sectors and geographies who come together once per year in Chicago to share their stories, invoke deep introspective thought, and spark creativity. The group in attendance includes leaders from business, government, non-profit, the arts, academia, and defense.

In Chicago we we discovered the teaBOT, an incredible machine which allows the user to create their own custom blend of tea using a touch screen. There are seven available teas which translates into hundreds of possible blends to discover! The teaBOT has since joined our team and is available for all to enjoy.

Also in September, Amanda travelled to our sister clinic in Montreal for a day of benchmarking. There, she filled a notebook with details of the things that they are doing remarkably well and ways in which we can improve our patient experience and offerings.

OCTOBER

In October, Dr. Fritz participated in the European Head and Neck Surgery Conference in Amsterdam which presented the current multidisciplinary management of head and neck cancer.

Also this month. Dr. Fritz and his team published two notable articles in Oral Health. The first was Part II of the Executive Summary of the updates to periodontal disease classification, specifically discussing peri-implant health and disease. As a logical follow-up, the second publication in the October issue of Oral Health, was an update to the implant care protocol that was developed in 2008. This protocol to maintain implants has been incorporated into dental practices and hygiene schools around the world. This latest critical update incorporates a new technology called Guided Biofilm Therapy (GBT), which decontaminates the implant in a way not possible with conventional instruments. As leaders in the field. EMS the manufacturers of GBT technologies flew two of their top clinical instructors to our clinic in Fonthill for an immersive day of hands-on learning. Now, not only are our dental hygienists and assistants proficient in GBT, they are certified trainers of the innovative technique. Dr. Fritz and his team will be lecturing on the Fonthill Implant Care Protocol across North America in 2020.

It is with great pleasure and excitement that we move in to the next decade of innovating the collaborative specialty of periodontics together.




BUILDING THE FUTURE TOGETHER
